Highlights of the Latest Major Legislative, Administrative and Regulatory Activity in the State Capitol

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<u>CREC HELD, PROVIDES OPTIMISM FOR FUTURE FISCAL YEARS</u> – The January *Consensus Revenue Estimating Conference (CREC)* was held this morning with *CREC* leaders slightly revising future revenue projections higher than originally expected.

Why it matters: January *CREC* is used to reevaluate the consensus revenue estimates for *Fiscal Years* 2023-24, 2024-25, and 2025-26. *Governor Gretchen Whitmer* will use the revenue estimates from today's conference to build her executive budget recommendation, which is expected in early February.

ICRC ORDERED TO DRAW NEW HOUSE MAP BY FEBRUARY 2 – On Monday, *U.S. District Judge Paul Maloney* on behalf of the three-judge panel overseeing the *Agee v. Benson* case ordered that the Michigan *Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission (ICRC)* must draw a new map for the seven state *House Districts* that were ruled unconstitutional by February 2, 2024.

The bigger picture: In December 2023, the judge panel ruled that *House Districts* 1, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12 and 14 were unconstitutionally drawn by the *ICRC* for violating Detroit residents' Equal Protection rights. This week's ruling gives the *ICRC* the ability to correct the seven *House Districts* by February 2<sup>nd</sup> instead of relinquishing power to a special master. Notably, the panel also denied the *ICRC*'s request to stay an injunction on the *Department of State* from holding any future elections until new maps are drawn, as well as denying the plaintiffs' request for special *Senate* elections to be held in 2024.

**2024 SESSION GAVELS IN, HOUSE REPUBLICANS PUSH FOR SHARED POWER** – On Wednesday, the *Legislature* gaveled in for their first official day of the new legislative year. The first day is largely ceremonial with no significant legislative activity planned for the session.

The bigger picture: With the *House* gridlocked in a 54-54 partisan split, a feeling of uncertainty on how the day's proceedings would unfold was palpable. And, apparently for good reason, as *House Republicans* moved to adopt *House Resolution 171*, introduced by *House Minority Leader Matt Hall (R-Richland Township)* which would amend the *House's* standing rules to enter into a "shared power agreement" during a period when the number of members duly elected and serving as *House Democrats* equals the number of members duly elected and serving as *House Republicans*.

## **ELECTIONS**

- Representative Christine Morse (D-Kalamazoo) announced this week that she is not seeking reelection in the House and is returning to practice law after her current term ends. Representative Morse is in her second term in the House.
- Former U.S. Representative and current U.S. Senate candidate *Mike Rogers* announced this week that he has endorsed *former President Donald Trump*. In a statement, *Mr. Rogers* said, "We all know we can do better; we just had it under *President Trump*. The first step to getting America back on track starts with putting an end to Bidenomics and returning to the leadership and proven policies of *President Trump*..."
- Representative Bill G. Schuette (R-Midland) announced this week that he is going to run for reelection in the state House, rather than pursue Congress or the state Senate. Representative Schuette teased a "big announcement" was forthcoming, which led many to believe he would run for Congress. Instead, he stated he wants to help Republicans win back the House.
- *U.S. Representative Elissa Slotkin (D-Holly)* announced that she raised \$2.8 million in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, bringing her cash on hand to \$6 million. *Representative Slotkin* is considered one of the frontrunners in the *U.S. Senate* race in Michigan. Since announcing her candidacy for the seat in February 2023, *Representative Slotkin* has raised \$11.7 million.

## **ODDS AND ENDS**

- Numerous former Republican gubernatorial candidates who were disqualified from the 2022 ballot due to fraudulent signatures testified in court this week against the campaign consultants who gathered the fraudulent signatures. Donna Brandenburg, James Craig, Perry Johnson's political consultant John Yob, Michael Brown's campaign consultant Jeff Evans, political consultant Mark Grebner, and Adam Fracassi with the Department of State all testified against Shawn Wilmoth, Jamie Wilmoth-Goodin and Willie Reed, the owners of various signature gathering companies involved with the campaigns.
- Both of Michigan's U.S. Senators voiced their support for President Joe Biden's nomination of Assistant U.S. Attorney Robert White to be a U.S. District Judge in the Eastern District of Michigan. Mr. White has served as an assistant U.S. attorney in the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Michigan since 2018.

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
