ICRC REMEDY MAPS APPROVED BY FEDERAL JUDGE PANEL – The Michigan *Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission's (ICRC)* remedy map submitted to a three-judge panel was approved this week by the judges.

Why it matters: The federal judges required the *ICRC* to redraw seven *House Districts* at the end of 2023 due to select districts in Detroit violating the *U.S. Constitution's Equal Protection Clause* by using race as a predominant factor in those districts. The *ICRC* submitted their remedy map in February, which was approved on Wednesday as resolving the *Equal Protection Clause* issues. The Motown Sound FC E1 will be the new map utilized in the 2024 elections.

COURT OF APPEALS RULING ON MICHIGAN'S INCOME TAX APPEALED TO THE MSC -

Business groups and *Republican* lawmakers have made an appeal to the *Michigan Supreme Court (MSC)* about a ruling issued by the *Court of Appeals* earlier this year that a 2015 road funding law triggering a cut to the state's income tax was for one year only.

The bigger picture: Earlier in March, a *Court of Appeals* panel agreed with *Court of Claims Judge Elizabeth Gleicher* that the state's income tax reduction, triggered by a surplus in state revenues would be for one year only, not in perpetuity. Multiple business groups and *Republican* legislators are appealing this ruling to the *MSC* in an effort to make the income tax reduction permanent.

ELECTIONS

Representative Pat Outman (R-Six Lakes) announced this week that he will seek reelection in the House in 2024, rather than wait for Senator Rick Outman (R-Six Lakes), who is his father, to term out in 2026 and then run for his seat. Representative Outman said he contemplated a run for the Senate in 2026 and saving two terms of eligibility in the Senate but due to family commitments is again running in the House, which leaves him with six years of eligibility remaining in 2026.

ODDS AND ENDS

• The City of Detroit received its first investment grade credit rating since 2009, with Moody's Investment Services issuing a two-notch bump from Ba1 to Baa2 status. Moody's issued a report last week describing Detroit's financial performance improvements over the last 10 years as reasons

for continued confidence. *Detroit Mayor Mike Duggan* released a statement, saying, "It has been 10 years of hard choices and sound financial management by these great leaders. No one in 2014 would have predicted Detroit returning to investment grade in less than a decade."

• The *Michigan Supreme Court (MSC)* is considering making amendments to its original actions rules to allow for two new actions related to presidential elections. One change would add an action for judicial review under *Michigan Election Law* to challenge determinations made by the *Board of State Canvassers* and those involving mandatory recounts (MCL 168.46); and another regarding procedures for contesting presidential elections for erroneous certification, or a determination of the results (MCL 168.845a). The *MSC* will collect public comment on the rules change until July 1.
